It was in 2011 that I founded Sylvenie Lindor Foundation with the goal of working closely with the Black Francophone community with a focus on youth. Our goal is to promote inclusion, integration, and acceptance so that youth can develop leadership and entrepreneurial skills to better thrive in our great country, and become more active in their communities. We have made many of our youth become ambassadors for our Foundation, enabling them to work, volunteer, and give back to their communities. We consider our youth to be vital members of our team, and they have done a fantastic job helping us fight the spread of the Covid-19 virus, planning events, and doing many other important tasks.



The year 2021 also marks the 25th anniversary of the national recognition of Black History Month in Canada. Black History Month is an important annual event that allows us to reflect on the amazing contributions that people of African descent have made to the Canadian society. We take time to remember the legacy of incredible individuals like Viola Desmond. Seventy-five years ago, Viola Desmond led a crucial resistance against social injustice and racial inequality in Nova Scotia. Desmond is one of many Black Canadians who have done great things and contributed much to our country's unique identity. We are all aware that 2020 was one of the most difficult years we have ever had both in Canada and globally. Despite this harsh reality, our Foundation has soldiered on, and we remain extremely proud of our projects such as « Toronto Youth Action for Change», our « Paid Volunteer Youth Program », our « Emergency Relief Response for Covid-19 Program» and our « Feed the Homeless initiative». We would like to extend our deepest thanks to both the Provincial and Federal Governments for their hard work and strong efforts aimed at fighting the spread of Covid-19.

As we continue with the commemoration of the International Decade for People of African Descent as proclaimed by the United Nations for the decade spanned from 2015 to2024. This is both a critical time and opportunity to address the needs of people of African descent in Canada. The issues at the forefront can be seen as systemic racism as well as anti-black racism.


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A MESSAGE FROM OUR EMERGENCY RELIEF RESPONSE FOR COVID-19 COORDINATOR

My name is Daniel Steinhart. I am the General Secretary for the Sylvenie Lindor Foundation. I also serve as the Emergency Relief Response for Covid-19 Coordinator. I became part of the Sylvenie Lindor Foundation in 2014.

With the Covid-19 Pandemic, our Foundation has made it a priority to assist groups that have been disproportionately impacted. As the Coordinator for this program, I have been active in organizing, overseeing, and managing our activities such that we can reach the highest number of individuals and families in need. I have been an integral part of obtaining and securing the crucial supplies that we need in order to do our relief work in response to the Pandemic. Beyond supplies, we have needed vehicles, locations to do prep, as well as on-call staff such that we can

Lastly, it has been my job to set up important Virtual meetings in order that we can carry out our operations in accordance with government restrictions as relates to Covid-19.



Our team is made up of lawyers, successful business leaders, community activists, nurses, teachers, sociologists, economists, interpreters, accountants, philosophers, social workers, youth counselors and young people who are engaged in and are deeply committed to our community.











History

The Sylvenie Lindor Foundation was founded in 2011 in Toronto by Amikley Fontaine. The Foundation is a non-profit organization named after the late mother of the founder, Sylvenie Lindor. The Foundation has emerged as a means toward helping Young Black Francophone Canadians succeed. While using soccer and Youth Forum (dialogue) to reduce social and linguistic barriers in an interaction setting, our goal is to foster economic integration and inclusion for Black youth in assisting them to access the resources they need to fulfill their potential. Our work focuses on training and programs that foster economic Integration and wellbeing of Black youth. Annually, we serve about 500 hundred Black youth Canadians in the Greater Toronto Area (GTA) in different fields such as: Soccer Clubs, Bilingual Job fair, and Youth Forum.




Mandate & Mission

The mandate of the Sylvenie Lindor Foundation is to work with Black youth of Francophone backgrounds and other youth to help them develop leadership skills they need to better integrate into the City of Toronto. Our work focuses on training activities and programs that foster economic integration and wellbeing of Black youth.



Objective

Our goal is to empower Black youth to fully reach their potential. While using social and sport activities like soccer games and Youth Forum (dialogue) to overcome challenges (crime, poverty, unemployment, etc), our goal is to foster economic integration and inclusion for Black youth in assisting them to access the resources they need to fulfill their potential.



Histoire

YOUTH LEADERSHIP AND ENTREPRENEURSHIP

The Sylvenie Lindor Foundation was started by Amikley Fontaine in 2011. Since its inception, we have primarily worked with the Black Francophone community in Toronto with a focus on youth. Our main goal is to promote inclusion, integration, and acceptance. In working with youth, our aim is to help them develop important skills related to leadership and entrepreneurship such that they can reach their potential and have a bright future. We work with youth who serve as ambassadors for the Foundation allowing them to get involved and give back to their community. Our work is also very focused on the family unit, and ensuring that families in difficult circumstances can stay together. Our Foundation has hosted 10 webinar sessions on Zoom where 10 expert speakers have been invited to discuss how to guide youth in building leadership and entrepreneurial skills that we believe will help them in their journey. The focus of these sessions has also been to work closely with youth on what is involved in starting a business and getting more active in the community. Lastly, the youth involved in the Foundation have played a major role in fighting the spread of the Covid-19 virus through participating in both assembling and distributing important items to those who need it most.

MULTICULTURAL FORUM

Every year, the Foundation hosts a Multicultural Forum. The purpose of this annual event is to initiate a crucial dialogue on many important issues that are at the forefront. This forum includes guest speakers whose speeches are followed by an open discussion. It is also a cultural celebration where foods and refreshments are served and participants take time to socialize and entertain themselves.










PAID VOLUNTEER YOUTH PROGRAM (PVYP)

The Paid Volunteer Youth Program (PVYP) is an initiative where we have helped 35 youth become active members of their community. This Program was launched during the COVID-19 Pandemic in order to help youth stay focused and on track during these difficult times. We offer them an opportunity to work, build skills and gain experience paving the way for a brighter future. We believe that, through this program, youth can get on a path towards success where they can accomplish great things. Youth targeted by this program have faced challenges and obstacles that have impacted their ability to prosper. Therefore, PVYP is aimed at working with youth to overcome adversity and make a better life for themselves. These youth have been very involved in the Foundation's activities such as managing the website, participating in outreach, serving as community facilitators, taking pictures, designing flyers, driving to deliver food and other items, planning events and activities, and carrying out administrative tasks. Lastly, these youth have been extremely busy as part of our work to fight the spread of Covid-19.

TORONTO YOUTH ACTION FOR CHANGE (TYAC)

The Toronto Youth Action for Change (TYAC) project was launched in December of 2019 at the Marriott Hotel in Downtown Toronto and ran up until September of 2020. This incredible project has allowed us to reach out to over 2000 youth in the GTA through many workshops and outreach programs. We are extremely happy about the impact of this project considering the number of participants and we hope to continue to work with more amazing youth moving forward. With a focus on leadership and entrepreneurial skills, we work to assist youth in determining what they would like to focus on in their lives and how to take on a leadership role in the activities they participate in. One activity we have facilitated that has been wonderful for the participating youth is our soccer and sports competitions. These social activities help relieve stress and can have a positive impact on mental health. The main focus of our TYAC project is to increase community engagement. The youth involved in this project went door-to-door to assist individuals during this pandemic and have also been on the phone working to ensure people's safety at this time. Lastly, youth Ambassadors have visited the homes of many elderly individuals in order to offer support and assistance to these individuals as best they can during the pandemic.













THE SÉANCE MATHIEU D'ACOSTA SESSION

The month of February is dedicated to the celebration of Black history across Canada. The Foundation has always been active in the celebration of this event. As always, during the month of February, we take time to remember the amazing contributions that people of African descent have made to our great country. We also take time to remember and honor those who have contributed to black history in Canada and around the world such as Mathieu D'Acosta, Viola Desmond, and Lincoln Alexander whose incredible legacies have had a lasting impact on our society and culture. Overall, the Black History Month gives us a chance to honor individuals who have made a difference in the world as well as in the Black community which is a vital contributor to the Canadian identity and landscape.

The Mathieu D'Acosta Session was held on February 22, 2020 at the Toronto City Hall in downtown Toronto in honor of Mathieu D'Acosta who is recorded as the first black person to live in Canada in the 1600s. This session was hosted by our Foundation as part of the Toronto Youth Action for Change project. Over 200 youth were present at this event and there were a total of 3 workshops where 45 youth were initiated to entrepreneurship. These workshops were designed to help youth gain practical training and skills they could use to start up their own business, foster their civic engagement with their community, and to become better integrated into the Canadian labor market.

THE SÉANCE LINCOLN ALEXANDER SESSION

The Lincoln Alexander Session was held on Friday, July 24th, 2020 at the Holiday Inn hotel in Etobicoke North. Due to the impact of the Covid-19 Pandemic, the event was live streamed on the Foundation's Facebook page. Only special guests, media, speakers, and our staff were in attendance in accordance with the recommendations of Canada and local public health. This event paid tribute to the lawyer Lincoln Alexander who was Canada's first black Member of Parliament, first Federal Cabinet Minister, and first black Lieutenant Governor of Ontario. The topics were about: **Social Justice, Public safety and the Impact of the covid-19 on the wellbeing of Youth** with the following keynote speakers:

- Danielle Cantave, Med, PhD student in education;
- Dr. Mark Martin, Epidemiologist, immigration & Refugees consultant
- Dre. Rosemary Sadlier, Historian, OONT;
- Mr. Mark Louis, CEO of the gun violence movement.

THE SÉANCE VIOLA DESMOND SESSION

The **Viola Desmond Session** took place on June 27th, 2020 for Canadian Multiculturalism Day. This is a day to celebrate how wonderfully diverse our great country is. Canada prides itself on being home to a wide array of different ethnicities and cultures. The Foundation usually celebrates Multiculturalism Day with a one-day soccer tournament with youth from Etobicoke North and Scarborough. Given the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, this year, the celebration took place during the Session. **Viola Desmond** was extremely vocal about social injustice and racial inequality in Nova Scotia. In 1946, Desmond challenged racial discrimination when she refused to leave the segregated Whites-Only section of the Roseland Theatre in New Glasgow, Nova Scotia. The **Viola Desmond** Session was a conversation about **Race, Justice, and Equality**. The Session addressed these issues in a multicultural context with the aim of fostering social inclusion and social cohesion. The session was live streamed on Facebook with the following keynote speakers:

- Attorney Joel Etienne, Specialist in Immigration & Criminal Law;
- Mrs. Jeanne Fortillus, PhD in Economics, HR Professional & Professor;
- Mr. Desmond Cole, Freelance Journalist, Author and Community Builder.









SOLIDARITY TORONTO WITH CHILDREN IN HAITI

The Foundation has always had a deep connection with the people of Haiti as well. One of our initiatives is Solidarity Toronto with children in Haiti and it was launched in 2014. Haiti is a country that has had a fair share of struggles and the Foundation is committed to working with the Haitian population with a focus on children so that they can thrive and make the most out of life. Also, the Haitian community in Toronto is very important to us and the Foundation values its special relationship with this community. We have provided aid to over



150 Haitian children and from July to September 2020, we sent a humanitarian convoy to assist in the country. Through this program, we have also sponsored 50 Haitian children such that they can go to school and have the supplies they need to learn. This past year, with the Covid-19 pandemic, the needs in Haiti have increased, and we continue to do our best to help the Haitian people cope with the effects of the pandemic in their home country.

EMERGENCY RELIEF RESPONSE FOR COVID-19

The foundation is currently offering a range of programs aimed at mitigating the spread of Covid-19. We have created many volunteer opportunities for students, allowing them to make a significant impact in their community by participating in the fight against the spread of the Covid-19 virus while developing important skills. Our Emergency Relief Response for Covid-19 program is designed to assist groups that have been disproportionately affected by the pandemic. These groups include seniors, homeless people, newcomers, and low income families. These groups have struggled making ends meet during this terrible pandemic and therefore require special assistance. The Foundation has been working to deliver food, clothing, PPE, toiletries, and other supplies to these groups so that they can orient themselves more easily in the current circumstances. We are happy to report that we have provided 2,000 kits to over 300 families. We also are proud to say that last year we helped 250 families in Toronto and Scarborough have a positive Thanksgiving experience with our Turkey and Donation Drive.

FEED THE HOMELESS INITIATIVE

The homeless population is one group that has really suffered during the Pandemic as living on the street at this time can make it very difficult to stay safe. Therefore, we have started a Feed the Homeless initiative where, in a vehicle, we distribute many helpful items to those who are currently experiencing homelessness. Through this initiative, we have been able to provide over 2,000 meals as well as PPE such as gloves and masks that are so important right now. It is also the case that, as a result of the pandemic, the homeless population has actually increased. Our Foundation views this as a serious problem and we have responded. We are currently expanding our operations to address the growing need for assistance, and we plan to continue assembling and distributing items so that people living on the street can still remain safe and protected while preserving their health.

FRANCOPHONE IMMIGRATION

In 2020, the Foundation was very involved in the 8th Edition of National Francophone Immigration Week. This is an initiative to raise awareness and promote Francophone immigration and diversity in the Francophone minority communities. It was an opportunity to open a dialogue on the reality of systemic racism suffered by many immigrants and to learn about other cultures. Many activities bring together Francophones regardless of their origins, and promote exchanges. For all Francophones, National Francophone Immigration Week represents the pride of flourishing inclusive Francophone communities and being involved in the construction of an identity rich in its diversity. According to the 2016 Census, Ontario has 622,415 Francophones. There are approximately 63,055 who live in Toronto. Our Foundation celebrated the 8th Edition with a panel of four speakers where the topic was *Housing & Justice for all during Covid-19*. In this context, for this event, we made a point of discussing the integration of the Francophone community in Ontario and the process of welcoming Francophone individuals. In addressing this issue, our Foundation distributed over 400 meals to homeless individuals in Downtown Toronto.



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INTEGRATE REFUGEES

Living as a refugee is a constant struggle, and for this reason the help that nations like Canada can offer goes an extremely long way. We at the Sylvenie Lindor Foundation are very committed to helping refugees integrate as they begin their new lives in Canada. One of the most essential is doing our part to make their experience as they are entering Canada less stressful and more manageable.

It would be an understatement to say that there are many challenges involved in welcoming refugees into Canada and helping them get back on their feet. It is all about inclusion and integration for we as human beings all want to be accepted by those around us and feel as though we are part of a community.

In aim to help our refugees in their new home here in Canada our team has already met with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees in Canada **Jean Nicolas Beuse** as well as the Federal Minister of Border and Crime Reduction **Bill Blair** and others branches of the Government addressing issues pertaining to social inclusion and economic integration of Refugee.











GRENADIERS FOOTBALL CLUB


